



GEORGIA - SWEDEN COUNTRY CONNECTION

Government and Commerce

Atlanta is home to the Honorary Consulate of the Kingdom of Sweden. Sweden has maintained a consular presence in Georgia since 1804. Thomas Rosseland has served as the current Honorary Consul since September 2017.

The Swedish American Chamber of Commerce (SACC) located in Atlanta promotes trade and investment between Georgia and Sweden through services such as trade shows, seminars and market research, as well as providing U.S. companies with highly qualified trainees from Sweden. Christina Searles Tai serves as Chairwoman of the SACC in Georgia.

Former Ambassador of Sweden to the U.S., Bjorn Lyrvall, visited Atlanta in June 2016 to celebrate Swedish National Day.

The State of Georgia has had continuous representation in Europe since 1973. Since that time the office has assisted hundreds of European firms locating in Georgia and Georgia companies exporting to Europe.

Academics

In the Fall semester of 2024, 46 Swedish students will be enrolled in USG schools.

The University System of Georgia (USG) offers at least seven study abroad programs to Sweden in programs such as engineering, industrial design and natural sciences.

The Georgia Institute of Technology offers exchange programs with two Swedish universities: the Chalmers University of Technology and Lund University. Georgia College & State University's College of Arts & Sciences offers two exchange programs at Swedish universities: Linnaeus University and Sodertorns University College.

Arts, Culture and Tourism

In 2023, 4,800 Swedish visitors spent \$7.3 million in the state of Georgia.

The 2016 Atlanta Scandinavian Festival featured The Nordic Singers, a group of professional opera singers from Iceland, Sweden and Denmark.

Every year the Swedish Women's Educational Association (SWEA) sponsors a traditional Swedish Christmas Market in Sandy Springs, Georgia.

Ulrika, the Swedish pop artist and co-founder of Grammy nominated Bravo Ocean Music Group, was a special guest at the 2018 Sweden Day event organized by the Consulate of Sweden in Atlanta and the Swedish Women's Educational Association.

In 2021, Elm Street Cultural Arts Center in Woodstock, Georgia presented Swedish Jam Factory, a duo who performed in multiple "Got Talent" competitions in Eastern Europe. The two use dancing as percussion as they sing and play multiple instruments.

International Trade

EXPORTS: In 2023, Georgia exports to Sweden totaled \$209.9 million. Sweden is the 38th largest export market for Georgia.

Top exports from Georgia to Sweden include tall oil, wood tar, civilian aircraft and parts, kaolin, and turbojets and turbopropellers.

Georgia leads the nation in the export of the following goods to Sweden: self-propelled work trucks, tall oil, and wood tar.

IMPORTS: In 2023, Georgia imports from Sweden totaled \$537.2 million. Sweden ranks 32nd among Georgia's importer nations.

Top imports from Sweden to Georgia include motor vehicles designed to transport people, exports of articles of imported for repairs, turbojets and turbopropellers, petroleum oils, and bombs and similar munitions.

There are at least **60 Swedish facilities in Georgia** supporting jobs for more than 2,900 Georgians.

Delta Air Lines offers daily one-stop connecting flights between Atlanta and Stockholm, Gothenburg, and Linköping. Scandinavian Airlines offers daily-one stop flights from Atlanta to Stockholm and Göteborg via Copenhagen, Denmark.

The Georgia Ports Authority (GPA) has an established relationship with Sweden. The Port of Brunswick offers direct service for Roll-on/Roll-off cargo.
