

GEORGIA - SOUTH AFRICA COUNTRY CONNECTION

Government and Commerce

The South African Embassy in Washington, D.C., has jurisdiction over Georgia. Her Excellency Nomaindiya Cathleen Mfeketo serves as Ambassador of South Africa to the United States.

The South African American Chamber of Commerce in Atlanta was established in 2009 to promote the exchange of business, trade, investment, technology, and culture between South Africa and the U.S.

Georgia and the state of Western Cape, South Africa, are members of the Regional Leaders Summit (RLS), a strategic alliance of seven international regions from five continents fostering the exchange of best practices on topics of mutual interest. Georgia hosted the 2014 RLS in Atlanta.

In 2016, Cape Town Mayor Patricia de Lille signed a letter of intent with former Atlanta Mayor Kasim Reed to deepen collaboration between the two cities. Atlanta will also be one of the partners on a new Center for American Studies supported by the Cape Town city government.

In 2007, native Georgian and former U.S. President Jimmy Carter joined Nelson Mandela in South Africa to announce the creation of a new humanitarian organization, The Elders, which focuses on issues such as poverty alleviation and human rights protection.

The Commissioner of the Georgia Department of Economic Development led a delegation of state officials and business leaders to South Africa to expand on business, trade and tourism opportunities in 2017.

Academics

In the Fall semester of 2024, 142 South African students will be enrolled in USG schools.

The University System of Georgia (USG) offers at least 20 study abroad programs to South Africa in education, history, business, animal science, and international affairs.

Both Emory University and the Georgia Institute of Technology offer study abroad programs to South Africa as well as exchanges with the University of Cape Town.

In June 2017, Clark Atlanta University hosted former President Obama's Young African Leaders Initiative participants for the fourth consecutive year. This program's cohort consisted of 25 young leaders dedicated to promoting positive change throughout Sub-Saharan Africa. Participants represented 19 countries, including South Africa.

Arts, Culture and Tourism

In 2023, 2,100 South African visitors spent nearly \$4.1 million in the state of Georgia.

Trenton, Georgia hosts an annual South African Festival celebrating with activities, food and entertainment highlighting South African culture. Every August, the Alliance hosts a South African Women's Day Celebration in Atlanta bringing women together from across the globe.

In 2016, Culture Trip voted Atlanta's High Museum of Art as one of the top ten places in the U.S. to see African art. In celebration of its newly expanded gallery for African art, the High Museum showcased nearly 40 recent acquisitions of art from Africa to enter the permanent collection in 2016, including pieces from South Africa.

Atlanta is home to the South African Women's Alliance, a non-profit organization working to support advancement and empowerment programs for women.

In 2018, Grammy Award winning keyboard artist Kristian Bezuidenhout performed in the annual Savannah Music Festival.

International Trade

EXPORTS: In 2023, Georgia exports to South Africa totaled \$136 million. South Africa is the 49th largest export market for Georgia.

Top exports from Georgia to South Africa include meat and edible offal of poultry, chemical woodpulp of soda or sulfate, parts and accessories for tractors and publictransport passenger vehicles, civilian aircraft parts, and motor cars.

Georgia leads the nation in the export of the following goods to South Africa: meat and edible offal of poultry, chemical woodpulp of soda or sulfate, and kaolin.

IMPORTS: In 2023, Georgia imports from South Africa totaled \$540.4 million. South Africa ranks 31st among Georgia's importer nations.

Top imports from South Africa to Georgia include motor cars, flat-rolled iron and nonalloy steel products, citrus fruit, retreaded or used pneumatic tires of rubber, and new pneumatic tires of rubber.

Capital Investment

There are at least **86 South African facilities operating in Georgia**. These South African-affiliated companies employ 330 Georgians.

Transportation

Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport offers daily non-stop flights between Atlanta and Johannesburg and three times per week non-stop flights to Cape Town. In 2024, the airport expects 523 flights carrying 128,000 passengers between Georgia and South Africa.

The Georgia Ports Authority (GPA) in Brunswick offers container services to Durban and East London.
